Control....Burt's
Greenhouses was started
by Brian Burt and Ruth
Hayward in 1981. It is built
on the Burt family farm 2
km north of Odessa. We
are known for the excellent
quality of our plants and the
friendly sales and work
environment.

We have always been

concerned about our physical environment and have tried to reduce the damage we do to the environment. One exceptional success we have had in this regard is in the use of Biological Pest Controls. This is the 4th year that we have not sprayed for insects at all in our greenhouses. We introduce a number of different insects into the



greenhouses which feed on plant pests. It takes some careful management but our experience has found beneficial insects more effective than chemicals. As a result of becoming pesticide free we confidently ate greens grown in our greenhouses all spring and summer last year.

This year we have taken chemical free disease and insect control one step further. We have introduced a number of Mycorryzal fungi that will form a relationship with the plants and protect them from disease causing fungi.

These efforts are important because they are helping to prove that it is not necessary to use chemicals for the control of insects and disease. If you want to know more please ask any of our helpful staff and they would be more than happy to explain the system we use to reduce our pesticide use.

Sometimes the Early Bird doesn't get the worm!

Gardening is your chance to get a taste of the farmer's life. You can make intelligent choices on what and when to plant and then have unusual summer weather effect your results. You are playing the odds. The odds say that for tender plants such as impatiens, begonias, peppers and cucumbers you should wait until the end of May to plant. These plants don't even like a chill let alone a frost. Experienced gardeners will tell you they often get a faster bigger crop by waiting because the plants don't get stressed when they are just starting out. Does that mean you have to wait to plant your whole garden? Not at all. Most perennials, pansies, petunias, onions and cole crops are happy to be planted at the beginning of May. To help you out, we move all our hardier crops out onto heated beds so that we can get them hardened off for you in advance of your purchase.

If in doubt, please ask and we will be more then happy to give you help with your timing decisions.

Sun, Shade? I'm confused....

If you look at the tags on almost any plant you buy it will tell you whether to plant it in sun, shade or something in between.

Sometimes what you have is obvious sometimes not.

Read the following definitions and then pay attention throughout the day to how the sun lands on your gardens to decide which conditions you have.



Deep Shade generally falls under the canopy of a tree or under the eaves of a building. The sky is largely blocked, and the plants only get indirect light. Partial Shade means full sun for part of the day and shade for part of the day. Timing of sunlight alters the effects of partial shade on plant growth. If the sun comes in the middle part of the day when sunlight in most intense, then plants that prefer shade may struggle.

Full Sun means at least 6 hours of direct sun per day. This sunlight must fall between 9 am and 4 pm when the sun is

stronger than it is in the early morning or late afternoon. Morning and Afternoon Sun are relatively weak, the sun is low on the horizon and the light is filtered through more atmosphere before it reaches the earth. These two are most often considered to be partial shade conditions.

A plant that is getting too much sun will have stunted leaves or bleached and burned foliage. One getting too little sun will be long and leggy with too few flowers or and overall weak and spindly look.

perennials - Each year
we add new varieties of
perennials. I thought I should
take stock and share with you
what we have.

I knew we had a lot of varieties to keep track of but even I was surprised at the numbers. We grow **426** different varieties of perennials **68** of which are new this year.

I like to have a good variety of all kinds of lilies and this year I am trying a number of heirloom varieties. I know I will be grabbing one of each to stick in the garden to see how they do. We have 15 different daylily varieties to choose from. Because there are so many different ones on the market I usually try to give a different assortment every year so you aren't always looking at the same old varieties. If you are a real daylily nut you can get in touch with the Canadian Hemerocallis Society,16 Douville Court, Toronto, ON, M5A 4E7.

The same story is true for Hostas. I am growing 31 varieties of those, 5 of which I have never offered before. There is an Ontario Hosta Society which is at Box 731, Erin, Ontario N0B 1T0.

We also have a variety of the fancy Heucheras which are sure to please.

As an experiment we have a selection of heaths and heathers plus some of the hardy vines.

As always we try to choose perennials that are hardy in this zone and stay clear of the ones that really aren't suitable but if you want information on varieties and hardiness then please ask.
