TA Te hope that you have had a wonderful winter and fully enjoyed the beginning of what is known as "imagining" season. Gardening is made up of several stages, most of which are commonly known. Spring is when planting takes place. Summer is the time when plants do most of their growing and the majority of maintenance work gets done in the garden. MITIGATE GLOBAL WARMING WITH TERRA-C

LEARNING HOW TO WATER PROPERLY

What is the most common question that we are asked? How often do I water? Our answer is always the same, and to some, not as satisfactory as they might like — "it depends" — and it does depend on many conditions. If you try to water on



a schedule you will be ignoring those conditions that determine the actual need for water. So you are asking "what do I do?" It's easy, you simply become a better gardener! That may sound glib, but the fact is that by checking your plants on a regular basis and

only watering them when you see that they need water, you will become a better gardener, getting better in touch with your plants. So back to the question, you should check your plants on a daily basis. Water when you see that the soil is dry using a combination of colour of soil and feeling the soil at depth (and weight if it happens to be a pot). As you become more experienced and more in tune with your plants it will become easier and easier. It is best summed up by this phrase from Yogi Berra "you can observe a lot by just watchin".

GROWING YOUR OWN VEGETABLES

or compost. It helps sandy soils hold onto water and nutrients. Because it is filled with millions of little holes, it provides a



home for the helpful soil organisms which make your plants thrive. Remember how it is very slow to break down? Thousands of years! You don't have to keep adding it year after year. This is our first year to sell Terra-C for the home gardener. We have given it to Ken Allan who does vegetable garden research and his results are very encouraging. You will be on the cutting edge of a new wave in gardening and taking a bit of CO2 out of the air while you are at it.

RAVENS WATCHING OVER GREENHOUSE

A simple pleasure that we enjoy at the greenhouses are the company of a pair or ravens nesting in one of the barns. It is really hard not to anthropomorphize these creatures. They seem to command the area, and rather than you observing them, the distinct impression is often that they are overseeing their domain and keeping an eye on all that happens. As they fly over the area you can see them land in virtually any location and just "chill". One of their favourite locations is our pile of wood chips, likely because it is a source of both water and easily transported building materials!

Although most of the time appearing quite laid back, whenever a perceived threat to the nest appears, one of the ravens will go into defense mode and it is anything but relaxing, especially for the target. Many times we've seen a red-tail hawk soaring above the barn with one of the ravens in hot pursuit. Despite being a large bird, they are amazingly dexterous as fliers, even executing barrel roles. The hawk, which is considerably larger, may not be under mortal threat, but it definitely disturbs it patterns enough to eventually give up and leave the area, no doubt breathing a huge sigh of relief as it flies off.

Once the eggs hatch and the babies fledge, the real fun begins. The children must learn the ropes and they start by following, or being herded by mom and dad over



the kingdom. While the adults have a slow grace to them (albeit sometimes loud!) the babies are the physical comedians. Often you can see them land on a building. The adults land effortlessly on the most precarious perch. The babies will try to land, miss the spot, and start a noisy slide down the roof until they recover.

When you are at the greenhouse, make sure to check out the ravens . . . you can be sure they will be checking you out.
